Faith – Holy, Glorious Prophet Elijah – 20 July


The Holy Prophet Elijah is one of the greatest of the prophets in the Old Testament. He was born in Tishba of Gilead into the Levite tribe in 900 B.C. The life of Elijah is recorded in the Old Testament books (3 Kings; 4 Kings; Sirach/Ecclesiasticus 48: 1-15; 1 Maccabees 2: 58). The name Elijah ('the Lord's strength') defined his whole life. He dedicated himself to the One God, settled in the wilderness and spent his whole life in fasting, meditation and prayer. Called to prophetic service, which put him in conflict with the Israelite king Ahab, the prophet became a fiery zealot of true faith and piety.

During this time the Israelite nation had fallen away from the faith of their Fathers; they abandoned the One God and worshipped pagan idols. Jezebel, the wife of king Ahab, was devoted to idol worship and she converted her weak husband to follow Baal. After three years of drought the Merciful Lord sent the prophet to appear before King Ahab and promise to send rain upon the earth. The Prophet Elijah told the king to order all of Israel to gather upon Mount Carmel, and the priests of Baal. When the nation had gathered, the Prophet Elijah proposed that two sacrificial altars be built: one for the priests of Baal, and the other for the Prophet Elijah, who served the True God.

The Prophet Elijah told them to call on their gods to consume the sacrificial animals with fire, and he would call on his. Whichever was first to send fire on the sacrifice would be acknowledged as the true God. The prophets of Baal called out to their idol all day in vain: the heavens were silent. Towards evening the holy Prophet Elijah built his sacrificial altar from twelve stones, the number of the tribes of Israel. So confident was he that he even soaked the wood for his sacrifice in water. Then the prophet turned to God in prayer. Fire came down from heaven and consumed the sacrifice, the wood, and even the water. The people fell to the ground, crying out: "Truly, the Lord is God!" Then the Prophet Elijah had all the pagan-priests of Baal put to death, and he began to pray for rain. Through his prayer the heavens opened, and an abundant rain fell, soaking the parched earth.

Later, the Lord commanded Elijah to anoint Elisha into prophetic service. Because of his fiery zeal for the Glory of God the Prophet Elijah was taken up alive into Heaven in a fiery chariot. The Prophet Elisha received Elijah's mantle, and a double portion of his prophetic spirit. According to the Tradition of the Holy Church, the Prophet Elijah will be the forerunner of the Second Coming of Christ. He will proclaim the truth of Christ, urge all to repentance, and will be slain by the Antichrist. This will be a sign of the end of the world.



Our trip to Turing House School to see what our new school will look like turned out to be fantastic. Mr Hounsell and I had fifteen students from Years 7, 8 and 10 with us and we ended up not just being impressed by the building but with the students and staff too. We were treated like VIPs.

The building is wonderful, everyone and everything in the same building. The bottom floor houses a fantastically kitted out auditorium with a huge stage and retractable seating. Behind the stage is a further large drama space. The sporting facilities brilliant, well kitted out sports' hall. What did impress too were the toilet facilities. They are not closed off as a separate room instead a student can walk into toilet area from the corridor. The cubicles have doors from floor to ceiling, so total privacy - opposite them are the sinks. It is a very safe environment.

The school has been opening now for two years yet there was no sign of wear and tear which bodes well for our new school. The canteen is airy and has a high ceiling where the upper floors can look down into.

The headteacher Mr O'Sullivan gave of his time generously, both in a length Q&A session and being our personal tour guide around the three floors of the school and the wonderful open areas outside as well as the spacious playing field.

Mountfitchet Castle



Last week, our Year 7 History students had the opportunity to step back in time with an exciting visit to Mountfitchet Castle near Stansted. This remarkable reconstructed Norman castle provided

a vivid glimpse into medieval life, enriching the students' understanding of their history lessons. Upon arrival, students were awestruck by the imposing wooden fortress, complete with its formidable gatehouse and high palisade walls. The castle, originally built in 1066, is renowned for its detailed recreation of a medieval stronghold, offering a hands-on

learning experience that textbooks simply cannot match. The self-guided tour led by St Andrew's knowledgeable staff began with an exploration of the inner bailey and the keep. Students ventured through various reconstructed buildings, including the blacks mith's forge, the bakery, and the granary. Each structure was meticulously designed to reflect the daily activities and lifestyles of the castle's original inhabitants.

The authentic replicas of tools, weapons, and household items provided a tangible connection to the past, making history come alive for the students.

In addition to the architectural marvels, Mountfitchet Castle is home to a variety of friendly animals that delighted the students. The goats, rabbits, and deer roaming freely within the castle grounds added a lively and engaging element to the visit. Students enjoyed interacting with these animals, who were remarkably tame and friendly, offering a unique and enjoyable experience.

As they boarded the coach back to school, the Year 7 students carried with them not just new knowledge, but also fond memories of an engaging and educational day spent exploring the wonders of Mountfitchet Castle.
