Key messages from the Headteacher

Dear Parents and Carers,

Thank you for your support and kind messages as we move into the Whitsun half term break.

Whitsun is the English name for the Church festival otherwise called Pentecost, held on the seventh Sunday after Easter as the commemoration of the descent of the Holy Spirit and the inspiration of the Apostles.

It seems particularly apt that we were able to say goodbye to our Year 11 and Year 13 students on Friday 28 May in two inspirational assemblies held just for our staff and students at St Katherine's Greek Orthodox Church which is walking distance from our school.

Father Damian delivered an inclusive and educational service where we learned many things including finding out about the long local history of the Church, the significance of St Katherine as a noted scholar and the importance of specific icons in a Greek Orthodox Church. Father Damian is a great teacher and we were able to interact and respond appropriately in the "Lord have service bν saying "Kyrie, eléison" as a whole school community. Above all, Father Damian's message to all of us was to take

time to reflect and pray; to take refuge from our busy lives in a place of worship; to remember that we are all God's children and that we are valuable and loved. This message applies to all of us regardless of our faith or where we worship. We are so blessed and give thanks for the support we receive from Father Damian at St Katherine's and Father John at St Demetrius Church.

After half term, Year 11 and Year 13 students will take part in a bridging programme in preparation for their next steps. Please refer to the letter from Ms Fourcade for further details.

Sunday of the Samaritan Woman



On Sunday 30 May, the fifth Sunday following Easter, we celebrate the feast of the Samaritan Woman.

The Samaritan woman, also known as the holy, glorious Great-martyr Photini-met Jesus at midday at Jacob's Well, which was located in the city of Sychar in the region of Judea of Biblical Palestine. Being tired from travel and the heat, Jesus sat at Jacob's Well to rest. A little after, the Samaritan woman came to draw water, and had a long conversation with Him (it is the longest recorded conversation between Christ and a human in the entire Bible, aside from those conversations with His disciples). Photini did not want to talk to Jesus, because the Samaritans did not have any dealings with Jewish people; Jewish people considered her people heretics, in other words Jewish people who had not kept to the strict laws of the Judaic faith. However, the Lord talked with her anyway, read her heart, revealed her secrets, and gave her the "Living Water"—the grace of the Holy Spirit that leads to eternal life and flows to all humanity—to drink. Photini immediately ran throughout the city to proclaim Christ. Through her, many other Samaritans believed in Jesus.

The woman at the well had her sins "washed away" by Jesus. The story shows that Jesus offers divine mercy in the living water of grace, which washes away sins and cleanses souls.

What this story depicts is Jesus' mercy and love for us. Desperate for a satisfying life and unending grace, the woman at the well is forever changed by Jesus' love for her. She uses her story to tell others about the living water found in Jesus.

By the intercessions of Thy Martyr, Photini, O Christ God, have mercy on us.

Amen.

Barnet: <u>CAMHS</u> in Schools is part of Barnet's Early Help offer that provides services and interventions for children 0 – 19 and their families. Barnet has three localities – East/Central, West and South. Each locality has a 0 – 19 Children and Families Early Help hub. The hub staff provide a range of help and support in many different venues across the locality. These services include Early Help Assessments (CAF), Family Resilience – direct interventions with children and parents, Targeted Youth Support, Early Years and Children's Centres and Child Wellbeing services. The hubs include a wide range of partners providing other services for children and families in order to have an integrated whole family way of working.



Mental health support for young people

On Tuesday 25 May, we were fortunate to be supported in school by qualified and accredited therapists from Barnet Integrated Clinical Services (BICS).

We were able to offer our students and staff a drop-in service to help those coping with grief.


