# Key Message from Executive Headteacher

It is Black History Month, which gives us in school a chance to celebrate and honour often overlooked accomplishments of Black Britons in all areas of endeavour throughout our history. We are threading events through our curriculum during this event, but we are conscious that recognising and highlighting diversity in our curriculum is not just for one month or on a given day.



My role models growing up were sporting stars, and one of the reasons I stopped attending football matches in the late 1970s and early 1980s was the racist abuse that I witnessed, which was aimed towards one of my favourite players, Vince Hilaire, by opposition supporters. Sport has changed and society has changed since then, but we must strive to do more to ensure that these attitudes never resurface and continue to enhance our curriculum such that our learners know and understand their place in the world and are accepting of others. In our diverse North London comprehensive the faith values we teach help our community learn and grow together.



Our week at school has been exciting. We now see the Brunswick Park Road from through the mesh fences at the edge of our playground as clearance work for our new site hits full swing; we can see diggers prepare the



ground for what will be the site of our new building! It will be thrilling to watch our new school rise in front of us.

I would like to thank all parents who have read our letters and previous newsletters regarding travel to and from school, and to those I have spoken with, for changing their dropping off and picking up routines. We are finding a daily rhythm with having just one entrance, which is working well. Thank you to those parents who are employing 'ride and stride', meaning dropping off a few streets away from the school. This really helps. One thing to bear in mind when dropping off or picking up in the local area is the impact on our neighbours. Please avoid blocking driveways or parking on double yellow lines when dropping off as this adds to congestion in the local areas. Thank you for your consideration of this.

This week . . . the myriad of sporting fixtures and other sports clubs after school have benefitted from the still warm autumn weather; Year 11s are hitting their stride with after school targeted intervention sessions; the focus in our sixth form study area is fantastic; and we

have had yet more primary parents tour our school as they finalise their transition decisions.

We look forward to seeing parents of our Year 13 students online next week for their last parents evening.

I will end with a thank you to our Heads of Year in Key Stages 3 and 4, who are establishing the culture and setting the tone in their year groups this year in the first term. Mrs Nelson (Head of Year 7 and 8), Ms Walt (Head of Year 9 and 10) and Mr Francis (Head of Year 11) embody our ethos of knowing and caring for each child.

# How is Jesus the Strength of God?

# Dropping off and picking up students

Dear Parents/Carers,

# Dropping off and picking up students – St Andrew the Apostle School

Thank you to all parents for working with us on the new dropping off and pick up arrangements following the closure of the Brunswick Park Road entrance to the North London Business Park. Thank you, also, to those parents who have made the choice to drop off and pick up off site as this reduces traffic and makes the site safer for St Andrew the Apostle students.

The owners of the North London Business Park are, however, concerned about the number of cars on site and being parked in both the disabled bays and on double yellow lines. They have asked me to write to all parents regarding this. As we get used to the new routines, parking enforcement has been lenient, but from Monday 3 October 2022, we ask that you only access the Business Park from 2.55pm to 3.20pm for the afternoon pick up. At this time, please avoid parking on the double yellow lines or in the aforementioned disabled parking bays. Drivers who park in these areas or outside these times may receive a parking ticket.

Please refer to the map overleaf. Parents/carers can use the parking bays at the front of the multi-storey car park; if these are full, parents and carers should queue around the multi-storey car park. If you reach the front of the queue and you have not collected your child, you will have to re-join the queue

Parents are also able to park on the ground floor of the multi-storey car park to wait for their child if they display a valid ticket.

# If on site


- Please do not park in disabled bays.

Thank you again for your continued support. We are hoping that pedestrian access via the Brunswick Park Road entrance will be open in approximately 12 weeks. This will help to ease traffic significantly. Your patience with the current situation is greatly appreciated.

# Flu vaccination campaign for years 7, 8 and 9



The NHS has written to schools to update them on changes to the national flu vaccination programme. Please see the contents of their letter below:

We have recently been informed that the flu programme will now include the school years 7, 8 and 9 from September this year.

Early information from the flu season in Australia, shows flu has been circulating earlier than expected and has been affecting younger age groups, therefore DHSC has taken steps to include these age groups in the 2022/23 vaccination campaign. Sessions for flu vaccination have already been planned and confirmed for primary schools so providers will be working with you to arrange additional dates to ensure vaccination can be offered to your students. It is likely that this will be from November onward once additional vaccine supply is available.

We would be very grateful if you could remind parents that their children are entitled to free flu vaccination on the NHS. This vaccine will be provided by a school aged vaccination team that visits the school and is given as a nasal spray. This form of the vaccine is very easy to administer and is especially well suited to preventing onward spread of infection.

The vaccine protects the child against the four main strains of influenza predicted to be in circulation this winter. Young children catch influenza very easily.

Children can spread the infection for up to 7 days, which is longer than in adults, therefore vaccinating children reduces the risk of influenza for family members, teaching staff and other children.

In school, children will be mixing with large numbers of other children in a confined environment, which increases the risk of germs (virus and bacteria alike) spreading. Vaccination builds children's immunity to protect against illnesses.

Vaccines stop influenza germs being spread, thus protecting the very vulnerable children and those in the wider community who may not have, or may not be able to develop, immunity.
