# Message from Headteacher

We've had an action-packed week at STA, dominated by Sports Day on Tuesday at the Lee Valley Athletic Centre. We were blessed with a slightly lower temperature and some welcome cloud cover, which formed the perfect backdrop to a full day of highly competitive athletics.

At a packed stadium we were treated to a magnificent spectacle thanks to the hard work of all the Teaching and Support Staff and in particularly that of the PE Department, ably guided by Mr Browell.

We saw some memorable relay performances (not least in the staff relay!) and some great individual track and field performances from our talented pupils, with an 11.56 s new school record by Savan in the Year 10 boy's 100 metres being a particular highlight. There was a lot of resilience on display, too. One great example was that of Year 10 pupil, Ellie, who had a nasty fall in an individual race but then dusted herself down to put in a tenacious display in a silver medal-winning relay team just a few minutes later.

This has also been a week of farewells, with the Year 13 prom and, hopefully, an 'au revoir', with our Year 11 Prom taking place this evening.

The school will definitely be open, but only for certain year groups: on Wednesday 5 July only Years 12, 10 and 9 will be in school and on Friday 7 July only Years 7 and 8 will be in school. Work will be made available on Teams for those year groups not in school as outlined in the letter sent yesterday to all parents. As telegraphed in the school calendar, there will be a staff INSET Day on 6 July and on this day the school will not be open. Thank you in advance for your patience in bearing with us next week.

# Faith- πίστη

# Saint Kyriaki





Next Friday (7 July) is the Feast Day of St Kyriaki, who was born in Nicomedia (modern day Turkey) to Greek parents Dorotheus and Eusebia. They were devout Christians, and when they had a child, since she was born on Sunday, the Lord's Day, she was given the name Kyriaki, the Greek word for Sunday.

From her childhood, Kyriaki consecrated herself to God. As she was a beautiful young woman, many suitors asked for her hand in marriage, but she refused them all saying that she had dedicated herself to Jesus Christ. A magistrate of Nicomedia also wished to betroth Kyriaki to his son, especially since she came from a wealthy family, but when she once more rejected his proposal, he denounced Kyriaki and her parents as Christians to Emperor Diocletian.

Diocletian, who was notorious for his persecution of Christians, ordered the family to be arrested and upon their refusal to honour the pagan gods, Dorotheus was beaten. Since this had no effect, Dorotheus and Eusebia were exiled to Melitene in eastern Anatolia. Kyriaki was sent to Nicomedia to be interrogated by his son-in-law and co-ruler, Maximian. When Kyriaki refused to renounce her faith, Maximian ordered that she be whipped. Since Maximian failed to persuade the young woman to change her faith, he sent her to Hilarion, the eparch of Bithynia in Chalcedon, either to convert Kyriaki to paganism, or send her back to him.

Hilarion tried his best with promises and threats, but when all these proved ineffective, he had her tortured. Kyriaki was suspended by her hair for several hours, while soldiers burned her body with torches. She was finally taken down and thrown into a prison cell. During the night, Christ appeared to her and healed her wounds. The next day, Hilarion announced that the gods had healed her out of pity and urged her to go to the temple and give thanks to them. When she was brought to the pagan temple, Kyriaki prayed that God would destroy the idols and a sudden earthquake toppled the idols and shattered them to pieces. Hilarion blasphemed God and was struck by lightning and died on the spot.

Kyriaki was tortured again by Apollonius, the successor of Hilarion. She was thrown into a fire, but the flames were extinguished, and then thrown to wild beasts, but they became tame and gentle, in an echo of the biblical story of Daniel in the lions' den. Apollonius then sentenced her to death by the sword. As she was given a little time to pray, she asked God to receive her soul and to remember those who honoured her martyrdom. Upon completing her prayer, she rendered her soul to God before the sword was lowered on her head. Pious Christians took her relics and buried them.

At the time of her death in AD 289, she was just 21 years old.

St Kyriaki offers a wonderful example of an independent-minded young woman who was singularly devoted to serving Jesus Christ, putting her Christian faith above everything else. A troparion dedicated to Saint Kyriaki is sung in the fifth Byzantine tone:

O virgin martyr Kyriaki, You were a worthy sacrifice When you offered your pure soul to God; Wherefore Christ has glorified you, And through you pours forth graces abundantly on all the faithful,

#### **Mobile Phones**



We would like to remind parents that the use of mobile phones is prohibited during the school day, and students should not use them to communicate with anyone including parents. 
